All of our programs were open once again! And our college students are back! Hot Meals served 112 meals. Woodstock Pantry served groceries to 348 people.

OUR AMAZING VOLUNTEERS

I want to recognize our Receiving and Packing Teams. On Friday, the OFB delivery truck didn't arrive until 8:15, 1¹/₂ hours late. While they waited, the team did a phenomenal job reorganizing the food between the basement, sanctuary and Outreach Room. As most of them go to work after their shift, they had to leave just as the delivery arrived.

Our Packing Team arrived to see the OFB truck unloading, and the pews filled with boxes. They stepped up to help the remaining members of the Receiving Team to move the 5,00lbs. of food. And then they did double-time to get the bags packed while ensuring that all three stations, i.e., dry goods, produce and ready-to-eat, had the support necessary to complete their work.

It was an amazing feat of people who came together as a community to solve a problem. And they did it graciously, with a sense of humor and while watching out for each other. This, my friends, is a hallmark indicator of a resilient community! Congratulations and thank you to all who stepped up and stepped in!!!

2024 GOALS

Now that we are officially in our new year, we'll start working on our 2024 goals. We'll start with Orientation!

Orientation

- All volunteers are required to do our basic orientation annually. This includes watching the Civil Rights and Food Safety Videos and reading the FIFO document for your shift. Your Team Lead will support you to complete the training. Here is what to expect.
- **Civil Rights** The Civil Rights Video introduces foundational values regarding the people we serve. In addition to serving food and basic supplies, we are building community. And we are learning to be a Trauma-Informed Food Site. The foundation for both are values around human dignity. We all need to live these values in our work.
- In the past, only volunteers who work directly with our neighbors took the training. This year, all volunteers will take the training. Whatever work you do, whether it's packing grocery bags or preparing hygiene supplies or cooking a meal, it must be done in a way that honors and respects our neighbors.
- Food Safety Most will watch the video. A few will update their Food Handler Card.

FIFO FIFO stands for 'First In, First Out'. This is a practice of serving our oldest food first to ensure we serve the highest quality food to our neighbors. Volunteers in each shift have different responsibilities regarding FIFO. You will read the FIFO document for your shift. The FIFO document also details the tasks completed to run a shift.

When you complete your orientation, you need to document it. Note that we have new logs for 2024.

HUNGER IN OUR COMMUNITY

<u>Oregon Food Bank</u> shared information on hunger that is crucial to our understanding of our work. I pulled two for you to consider. Then, I share information from research at the pantry conducted by our very own Zoe Drajem.

Hunger Fact #1

Prior to the pandemic, 1 in 11 Oregonians were food insecure, not knowing where our next meal might come from. Today, 1 in 5 people face hunger in rural, urban and suburban communities throughout the state - a dramatic increase driven by the ongoing economic fallout of COVID-19 and the rising cost of food and housing.

Hunger Fact #4

Food insecurity disproportionately affects specific communities in Oregon, regardless of geography. Historic inequities and systemic exclusions mean that Black, Indigenous and Communities of Color, immigrants and refugees, single moms and caregivers, and trans and gender-diverse communities are two to three times more likely to face hunger and poverty. By addressing these disparities, we can ensure everyone in our state has access to the essential resources we need to thrive.

Woodstock Pantry Research on Neighbor Demographics

- Zoe Drajem conducted research to learn about the demographics of our neighbors, <u>Woodstock Pantry Neighbor Demographic Report</u>. Zoe writes, 'Part of being a social service organization is ensuring that everyone knows about and has equal access to the resources you provide.' Her findings show that people from the communities identified by OFB (above) are overrepresented at the pantry.
- She concludes, 'As vulnerable populations are more likely to experience hardship, it is a good thing for them to be overrepresented at the pantry...We note that although we serve a higher percentage of Black/African Americans than are represented in our Service Area, there is a higher percentage of Black/African Americans in Portland. So, we plan to design outreach strategies to let folks know about our services.'
- As we enter the new year, we'll be designing and implementing those strategies. If you have any ideas, or have a connection, please let me know!
